## SAGE Health Tips

What medical problem do babies and seniors have in common that they may have to be rushed to the hospital emergency department?

### DEHYDRATION

Dehydration occurs when a person loses more water than they take in. Scientists warn that the ability to be aware of and respond to thirst is slowly blunted as we age. As a result, **older people do not feel thirst as readily as younger people do**. This increases the chances of them consuming less water (especially in the evening to avoid awakening many times during the night) and consequently suffering dehydration.

#### Symptoms:

**Mild dehydration:** dryness of mouth; dry tongue with thick saliva, unable to urinate or pass only small amounts of urine; dark or deep yellow urine, cramping in limbs; Headaches, crying but with few or no tears, weakness, general feeling of being unwell and sleepiness or irritability.

**More serious dehydration:** low blood pressure, convulsions, severe cramping, and muscle contractions in limbs, back and stomach, bloated stomach, rapid but weak pulse, dry and sunken eyes with few or no tears, wrinkled skin; no elasticity and breathing faster than normal.

#### Treatment:

**Drinking at least five 8-ounce glasses of water daily reduces the risk of fatal coronary heart disease** among older adults. Please consult your health provider for your maximum fluid intake per day amounts based on your current health status, especially if you have a heart condition.

Monitor your body weight. You should weigh yourself every morning. If you have lost two pounds or more from the day before, and especially if you feel thirsty or have a headache, you are probably dehydrated.

Consume an adequate amount of fluids during the day. Eat healthy, water-content foods (include in your fluid intake per day) such as fruit, vegetables and soups. Limit caffeinated products -which have a tendency to dry you out. Drink even when you're not thirsty: Keeping a water bottle next to the bed or your favorite chair could help, especially if you have mobility issues.

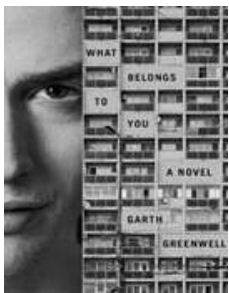

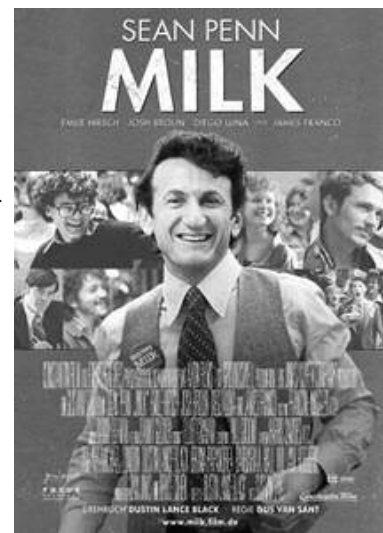
## SEE YOU AT THE MOVIES

In an attempt to shine a spotlight on those who have made life a little easier for Gays and Lesbians today, May's movie presentation will be **Milk**, in honor of **Harvey Milk**, who was born on May 22, 1930 and was assassinated on November 27, 1978 (at the age of 48).

Milk is a 2008 American biographical film based on the life of gay-rights activist and politician Harvey Milk, who was the first openly gay person to be elected to public office in California, as a member of the San Francisco Board of Supervisors. Directed by **Gus Van Sant** and written by **Dustin Lance Black**, both Out Filmmakers, the film stars **Sean Penn** as Milk and **Josh Brolin** as Dan White, a city Supervisor who assassinated Milk and **Mayor George Moscone**. The film received eight Academy Award nominations, including Best Picture, winning two- one for Best Actor in a Leading Role (Sean Penn), and one for Best Original Screenplay (Dustin Lance Black). Much of Milk was filmed on Castro Street and other locations in San Francisco, including Milk's former storefront, Castro Camera.



Milk begins on Harvey Milk's 40th birthday (in 1970). Politics and gay activism were not his early interests; he was not open about his homosexuality and did not participate in civic matters until around the age of 40, when he was still living in New York City and had not yet settled in San Francisco. It chronicles his foray into city politics, and the various battles he waged in the Castro neighborhood as well as throughout the city, amid political campaigns to limit the rights of gay people in 1977 and 1978 run by **Anita Bryant** and **John Briggs**. Both his romantic relationships (including one with **Scott Smith**, played by **James Franco**) and political relationships are addressed, as is his tenuous affiliation with troubled Supervisor Dan White. The film ends with White's double homicide of Milk and Mayor George Moscone. The film's release was tied to the 2008 California voter referendum on gay marriage, Proposition 8, when it made its premiere at the Castro Theatre two weeks before Election Day.

This is an important film for the LGBT Community, as well as an important film in American cinema. It will screen on Monday, May 15th, at 4pm in Room 204 of The Pride Center. Dinner will follow.

### Nursing Students Provide Service at Fort Lauderdale Event

A group of nursing students volunteered at the 40th anniversary of the Pride Fort Lauderdale festival on February 26 on Fort Lauderdale Beach. While scores of people were enjoying the musical entertainment, food, and conversations, the seven students spent most of their time in what they called the “Senior Oasis,” a tent reserved for SAGE (Seniors Action in a Gay Environment). There they screened the seniors, as well as younger adults, for high blood pressure and offered related health tips.

Layne Abreu, Maria Camejo, Joleesha Fahie, Richrmar Jean-Charles, Shyamazan Kahn, Scarlet Osorio, and Karen Urbina are currently enrolled in a clinical course taught by Dr. Roselle Samson-Mojares, a faculty member in the undergraduate nursing program. Samson-Mojares is a registered nurse. Working in two shifts between noon and 5:00 p.m., the students took more than 100 blood pressures and provided information on women’s health resources available for residents of Miami-Dade and Broward counties.

“The students had a wonderful experience,” according to Gene Majka, a registered nurse and adjunct faculty member in the College of Nursing and Health Sciences. Samson-Mojares added, “We all enjoyed participating—students and faculty alike.”
