SEE YOU AT THE MOVIES

The SAGE May movie is **An Early Frost**, the first production of any kind which dealt with AIDS. In addition to the new subject matter, it was awarded 4 Emmys (14 nominations). Another asset was the top-notch cast. When the film premiered in 1985, it aired at the same time as Monday Night Football when the former had more view-

ers than the latter, which was no small feat.

Michael Pierson (played by Aidan Quinn, "Benny & Joon", "Legends of the Fall") has the life that anyone would want: A condo on Chicago's Gold Coast; he is moving up the ladder at his law firm; and is the envy of his family living out of town. He decides to visit the folks, who are Katherine (Gena Rowlands, who received Best Actress Oscar nominations for "A Woman Under the Influence" & "Gloria")



& Nick (Ben Gazzara, "Run for Your Life" "Buffalo 66"). During his stay, Michael fails to reveal an important fact about himself to them. Peter (Michael's partner, played by **DW Moffett**) expresses his disenchantment with this omission. Meanwhile, Michael keeps coughing and sweats when lying in bed. He believes antibiotics will wipe out the pneumonia he was told he had. When the symptoms persist, tests are done, and he is told he has an immune deficiency disease. Michael asks, and is told, it is AIDS. The evolution of the characters is apparent throughout the rest of the movie where human emotions encounter the realities of the disease (what little was known at the time). During one of Michael's hospital stays, a fellow patient Victor (John Glover) gives him a purpose to keep on going. Another noteworthy scene involves Michael & Nick when their tenuous relationship comes to a head. According to the producers, several developments occurred during the filming. The AIDS virus was able to be separated and studied for research, and Rock Hudson's announcement that he had the disease added to the human element which may have contributed to the high viewership. No doubt that the production made the mainstream population aware of the plight that a growing number of individuals was experiencing.

An Early Frost is unrated & doesn't contain any objectionable material. It will screen with subtitles on Monday, May 21st at 4pm in Room 204 of The Pride Center. The 97-minute running time will allow viewers the opportunity to discuss the proceedings as we dine afterwards.

Blood Pressure

High blood pressure is sometimes called "the silent killer," because you do not feel it being high unless it is dangerously high. It is very common in older people and a major health problem. If high blood pressure isn't controlled with lifestyle changes and medicine, it can lead to stroke, heart disease, eye problems, kidney failure, and other health problems. High blood pressure can also cause shortness of breath during light physical activity or exercise.

Blood pressure is the force of blood pushing against the walls of arteries. When a health practitioner measures your blood pressure, the results are given in two numbers. The first number (top or listed first), called systolic blood pressure, is the pressure caused by your heart contracting and pushing out blood. The second number (bottom or next number), is called diastolic blood pressure, this is the pressure when your heart relaxes and fills with blood. Your blood pressure reading is usually given as the systolic blood pressure number over the diastolic blood pressure number, such as 138 (systolic)/72 (diastolic).

If the first number is higher than 140 this is called isolated systolic hypertension. This is the most common senior problem caused by age-related stiffening of the major arteries. Isolated systolic hypertension is treated the same way as regular high blood pressure but may require more than one type of blood pressure medication. If your doctor determines that your systolic pressure is above a normal level for your age, ask how you can lower it.

If your blood pressure is lower than 90/60, you have low blood pressure or hypotension. You may feel lightheaded, weak, dizzy, or even faint. Low blood pressure can be caused by not drinking enough liquids (dehydration), blood loss, some medical conditions, or too much medication.

You should check your blood pressure periodically. You can purchase a blood pressure machine at your nearest drug store or online. The blood pressure machines at Publix and major drug stores are good but they may have a reading a little higher than your own machine. Record your blood pressure at different times of the day and bring your results to your next health practitioner visit.

The good news is that blood pressure can be controlled in most people. There are many lifestyle changes you can make to lower your risk of high blood pressure such as: Maintaining a healthy weight; following a healthy diet; regular exercise; reducing salt intake; not smoking; alcohol in moderation; managing stress; and getting a good night's sleep.

If you do take blood pressure medication, please take it on time every day. Monitor your blood pressure and see your health practitioner periodically. Enjoy life and keep cool.

The past two years have seen a resurgence in good, Queer cinema. From the record-breaking 2016 **Moonlight** (filmed in Miami, on an independent budget, going on to win "Best Picture" against "La La Land") to 2017's **Call Me by Your Name** (nominated for four Academy Awards -and winner of a host of other awards). But these are only two of a sudden multitude of relevant LGBT films which speak to us. If not in theme and plot, then in casting and writing, directing and producing. The Pride Center realized this when last year our SAGE was asked to host Moonlight, just two days after its surprise win. We screened it on Coffee and Conversation Tuesday -and our experiment proved wildly successful. With 150 people from all over the Community enjoying the film.

With 2017 being such a banner year for our type of movies, we decided to try it again: At The Pride Center, our SAGE has shown **God's Own Country** (a Sundance Winner in Directing) and **Call Me by Your Name** (Oscar winner for James Ivory's Screenplay). We have decided to continue with these types of screenings on a monthly basis. On the second Tuesday of the month, at 1:15pm, in The Pride Center Main Hall. Open to the Community; free for all. This month, we will be showing the Best Picture of 2017: **The Shape of Water** (Guillermo del Toro's adult fantasy.) A picture with a major (not token) gay role (for Oscar-nominated Richard Jenkins), and a story about true love and humanity. But, like all fairy tales, it's not all sugar-and-spice: There are some intensely violent scenes and some sexual ones. So, come with your grown-up attitudes. And open minds.

This new film series in no way replaces our regular SAGE third-Monday screenings ("See You at the Movies") which will continue to concentrate on classic LGBT films. Together, the two screenings should complement one another nicely. We thank The Pride Center and its staff for this opportunity. And for the use of their Motion Picture Licensing Corporation Universal License (to which we have contributed) to make this possible.

Look for the monthly flyers. And come enjoy. And be amazed at what is out there for us.
