INDEPENDENCE DAY

On July 4, 1776, at the Pennsylvania State House in Philadelphia, the Second Continental Congress adopted the Declaration of Independence written by Thomas Jefferson, which proclaimed "unalienable rights...of Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness."

In 1779, Mr. Jefferson wrote a law setting forth castration as the maximum penalty for any man convicted of sodomy. The Virginia legislature rejected this proposed reform. The penalty of death would remain. One hundred eighty-six years later, in 1965, consensual same-sex activity was a felony in every state of the na-tion except Illinois, which had removed criminal penalties in 1962. The American Psychiatric Association classi-fied homosexuality as a form of mental illness. President Eisenhower's Executive Order 10450, banning homo-sexuals from Federal employment, remained in full force and effect.

On July 4th, 1965, at Independence Hall (formerly the Pennsylvania State House), forty courageous gay men and women staged a peaceful protest, quietly carrying signs reading "Homosexuals Should Be Judged As Individuals" and "Homosexual Civil Rights". Continuing through 1969, this annual "demonstration" was the begin-ning of a nation-wide movement by gay people to proclaim their unalienable rights of Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness.

During your 4th of July celebrations, pause to reflect on the achievements of the LGBT community over the past 50 years, and remember the struggle of all those who came before us. And acknowledge that much remains to be done. We still remain unprotected from discrimination by federal law or by laws in the majority of states. The fight for equality will continue.



A graceful debut novel by memoirist/literary scholar **André Aciman**, *Call Me By Your Name* charts an intense six-week



The SAGE July movie is *Whatever Happened to Baby Jane?*, a 1962 camp classic starring **Bette Davis** and **Joan Crawford**. The film perfectly showcases the actresses' well-chronicled rocky relationship. Baby Jane resulted from the intersection of the downward career paths that Davis and Crawford were then experiencing with the horror/black comedy genre that was beginning to take hold at that time.

Baby Jane (Davis) is a child vaudeville star, renown for the sentimental song, "I've Written a Letter to Daddy". Lifesize "Baby-Jane" dolls are hawked at the theatre following her performances. Jane is very much aware of being her family's meal ticket. Her sullen behavior is tolerated due to her mother's perception that Jane wouldn't amount to anything when she grows up. This turns out to be a self-fulfilling prophesy, as the adult Jane fails as an actress

while her sister Blanche (Crawford) achieves great fame.

After Blanche and the drunken Jane drive home from a party one night, a vengeful "accident" occurs in their driveway, which leaves Blanche a cripple and ends her career. Jane sublimates her guilt over the accident by becoming Blanche's full-time caretaker. Due to declining income and Jane's increasingly erratic behavior,



Blanche secretly plans to sell the sisters' home and seek proper care for Jane. Janes discovers Blanche's plan and, fearing that upon the sale she would be "put away" in a mental institution, Jane devises her own plan (albeit grandiose) of reviving her singing career. Jane becomes increasingly delusional and bitter, tormenting and isolating Blanche and achieving deception through imitating Blanche's voice and committing crimes that become chronologically more serious. Like in any classic picture with Davis or Crawford, a shocking revelation near the conclusion of the film becomes cathartic and addresses dangling threads the viewer may have contemplated.

When You're Hot, You're Hot

Those were the days, and now summer is in full bloom, and we are all hot again. The chances are you may experience heat exhaustion or worse. A heat stroke is a prime concern during these months. Who is at risk for this problem?

- 1. Infants and children under the age of 4 and adults 65 and older are at increased risk because the ability to regulate temperature is more difficult at these ages.
- 2. Prescription (as diuretics and hypertension medications) and over-the-counter medications (Benadryl) may cause us to dehydrate.
- 3. If you are obese, your body retains more heat and it is more difficult to cool your body down.
- 4. If the heat index is greater than 91°F. (32.8°C.), your sweat evaporates more easily and you may have a harder time cooling yourself off.

Heat Exhaustion versus Heat Stroke

Heat exhaustion occurs when people work or play in a hot, humid environment and body fluids are lost through sweating which causes the body to overheat and become dehydrated. The temperature may be elevated, but not above $104^{\circ}F$. (40°C.).

Heat stroke (also known as sunstroke) is a life-threatening medical condition. It usually develops because of untreated heat exhaustion. The body's cooling system, which is controlled by the brain, stops working and the internal body temperature rises to the point at which brain damage or damage to other internal organs may result (your temperature may reach 105°F. (40.5°C.).

Signs and Symptoms

Heat Exhaustion Symptoms
General weakness
Increased heavy sweating
Weak but faster pulse or heart rate
Dizziness
Nausea

Heat **Stoke** Symptoms
Elevated body temperature above 104°F. (40°C.)
Hot, dry skin
Rapid and strong pulse or heart rate
Fainting, confusion, coma
Vomiting

Heat stroke is a <u>life-threatening</u> medical emergency. If you suspect a heat stroke, call 911 or get to a hospital immediately.

Heat exhaustion treatment is to move the person to a shady area or inside with air conditioning and lie down. Drink water or a sports drink to held rehydrate yourself. Sports drinks have electrolytes, which your body loses through excessive sweating.

Enjoy your summer days in South Florida or a trip up North but beware of "old man" sun.

Rounding out the cast are an aspiring songwriter and music teacher Edwin (played by Victor Buono); his mother Dehlia (Marjorie Bennet) who (in a Cockney dialect) tweaks Edwin about his modest ambitions; the Hudsons' upbeat neighbor Mrs. Bates (Anna Lee) who speaks fondly of watching Blanche's old films on television to Jane's consternation; and Mrs. Bates's inquisitive daughter Liza (Barbara Merrill – who is Davis's real-life daughter). Baby Jane was produced and directed by Robert Aldrich ("The Dirty Dozen", "The Killing of Sister George") and is based on the 1960 book of the same title written by Henry Farrell.

The film received several Academy Award® nominations, including one for Davis as best actress. Had she won, Davis would have achieved three Oscars™ -a feat not accomplished at that time. When she didn't receive the award, Davis openly blamed Crawford's lobbying Oscar™ voters not to vote for her as the cause. Instead, Baby Jane was awarded the Oscar™ for best Costume Design, whose macabre wardrobes are a testament to the film's effort.

Despite their antagonistic relationship, Davis and Crawford were shrewd business women when they both sacrificed money to do their film roles, and instead agreed to take a percentage of the earnings. Due to the advanced publicity and its star power, Baby Jane took in almost \$10 million (approximately \$80 million in 2018) at the box office. Baby Jane is unrated and will screen with subtitles on Monday, July 16thth at 4:00pm in Room 204 of The Pride Center. The 133-minute running time will allow viewers the opportunity to discuss the proceedings as we dine afterwards.




