
THE ROUND TABLE

This CoEd group, sponsored jointly with The Fort Lauderdale Prime Gentlemen, is meeting remotely using the *Zoom* platform to discuss contemporary topics and ideas from **2:30-3:30pm**

on the second and fourth Monday of each month. Sessions have a moderator who presents a brief background on the discussion topic chosen for the session. The topic scheduled for February 8th is The Pipe Organ, presented by Michael Martin - Many of us have looked at a pipe organ and wondered how the pipes, keyboards, buttons, and pedals all work together. As a professional organist, Michael will attempt to answer this question. He'll explain how he first became fascinated with the organ and how it has affected his life. He'll also discuss his current project of building an affordable 'Virtual Pipe Organ'. The topic scheduled for February 22nd is A Real-Life Horatio Alger Story, presented by Lou Wangberg - Lou was born the grandson of Norwegian immigrants and a poor farm kid with few prospects who went on to dine with Presidents, Prime Ministers, and Kings. He eventually played a major role in running state government. His is a real-life Horatio Alger story and he will provide some of the highlights on how it all happened. SAGE BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP



For readers searching for a fast-paced, meticulously researched, thoroughly engaging (and often infuriating) look-see into the systematic criminalization of gay men and widespread condemnation of homosexuality post-World War I, cultural historian James Polchin's first book – Indecent Advances: A Hidden History of True Crime and Prejudice Before Stonewall – is a smart bet. Blending key historical markers, such as psychiatrist Edward Kempf's

theory of "acute homosexual panic" in the 1920s and the first edition of the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual's inclusion of homosexuality as a psychological disorder in the 1940s, with gruesome true-crime stories involving Tennessee Williams, Jack Kerouac and a slew of lesser-known perpetrators and victims, Polchin dissects how medical misconceptions and media biases have stoked Americans' fear of the queer lifestyle, perpetuated the stereotype of gays as abnormal and immoral hedonists, and condoned violence committed against "homosexual hoodlums" for decades. In later chapters, Polchin rightly shifts his focus to hint at the seeds of progress in the struggle for gay equality. The Sage Book Group will discuss this enlightening and provocative cultural history via Zoom on Saturday, February 13 from 11am to 12 noon.

Know Your Vacs

The vaccines have arrived and as of this writing (early January) we have two available vaccines with more to come. You have to know which vaccine you are receiving, how the administration will be performed (once? twice?) and make sure to record the dates (where you will see them for a reminder, such as the refrigerator door?), if you require two vaccinations. COVID-19 vaccines that require two shots may not protect you until a week or two after your second shot. The vaccine can be administered but safety data is limited for the following underlying conditions: HIV, Auto-immune diseases, Guillain-Barre syndrome and Bell's Palsy.

CDC Notes

- Vaccine doses purchased with U.S. taxpayer dollars will be given to the American people at no cost. However, vaccination providers may be able to charge administration fees for giving the shot. Vaccination providers can get this fee reimbursed by the patient's public or private insurance company.
- Common side effects (may or may NOT occur) and others may occur, too:
 <u>Injection site:</u> Pain or swelling. Treatment Apply a clean, cool, wet washcloth over the area. Use or exercise your arm.



The rest of your body: Fever, Chills, Tiredness Headache. Reduce fever —drink plenty of fluids and dress lightly.

Over the counter medications such as Tylenol may help. Always check with your health care practitioner.

Call your health care practitioner: In most cases, discomfort from fever or pain is normal. Contact your doctor or healthcare provider: If the redness or tenderness where you got the shot increases after 24 hours; If your side effects are worrying you or they do not seem to be going away after a few days.

PVM

Will Post Vaccine Masks (PVM) be required? **YES**. Some of those vaccine antibodies will circulate in the blood to the nasal mucosa and stand guard there, but it's not clear how much of the antibody pool can be mobilized, or how quickly. If the answer is not much, then viruses could bloom in the nose — and be sneezed or breathed out to infect others. This means that as an unmasked vaccinated individual you can still carry the virus in your nose and spread it to others. When you may stop wearing masks will be determined (by the CDC) when a specific percentage of the population has been vaccinated.

Take Care of Yourself and Your Community

Taking care of yourself is job number one. Helping others cope with their stress, such as by providing social support, can also make your community stronger. During times of increased social distancing, people can still maintain social connections (SAGE ZOOM & soon ZOOM Hybrid meetings) and care for their mental health. Phone calls or video chats can help you and your loved ones feel socially connected, less lonely, or isolated.
