Honoring LGBT Elders



May 16th marked the 5th annual **National Honor our LGBT Elders Day.** Congressman Ted Deutch (22nd District – Florida), chair of the House LGBT Elders Task Force, introduced a resolution to commemorate the day, stating: "The elder generation of the LGBT community helped our country make significant strides toward equality, and they continued that fight in the face of decades of bigotry and, too frequently, violence. We should celebrate this population for who they are and what they have accomplished to help bring about incredible change for all LGBT people."

Tremendous strides have been made towards equality since the Stonewall Uprising fifty-two years ago, and the "older Americans" who have fought the good fight for equal rights deserve our praise. But full equality remains to be achieved. This past February the US House of Representatives, in an effort to address this inequity, passed the Equality Act. The Act, which would amend the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to include sex, sex orientation, and gender as classes protected from discrimination, awaits passage by the Senate to become law.

If, and when, the Act passes and offers equal protection under the law to the LGBT community, LGBT elders will continue to remain unequal when it comes to the physical and emotional challenges of aging. SAGE USA, reporting in their *Facts on LGBT Aging* study, found that 21 percent of older LGBT individuals (versus 6 percent of non-LGBT individuals) have provided care to friends; that many LGBT people delay or avoid medical care because they fear discrimination by health care workers, and as a result, have high rates of poor physical health and mental distress; and that older LGBT people are more likely to be living alone, with smaller social support networks. Research shows loneliness and isolation are associated with poor physical health.

What can you do to combat the loneliness and isolation that afflicts older LGBT people? You can support the mission of SAGE of South Florida by participating in our activities, and by socializing and engaging with other members. Yes, you can make a difference in someone's life. Especially now, as the pandemic starts to wane and we have the opportunity to re-enter the world.

SAGE USA has adopted a revision to the Pride flag. They've added a silver stripe to honor the growing, vibrant elder LGBT population. This change should be lauded and applauded. We have earned that stripe.



SAGE BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP



"I never repeat gossip," Dominick Dunne liked to joke, "so listen closely the first time." It was the perfect one-liner for a man who made a career out of peddling rumors and anecdotes about the rich and glamorous people he encountered. Before his death at 83 in August 2009, Dominic Dunne had led many lives: Hollywood producer, screenwriter, celebrity journalist, victims' advocate, TV host, father, husband, closeted

gay. Robert Hofler's - MONEY, MURDER, AND DOMINICK **DUNNE** – begins with the boy playing his first and most uncomfortable role to a demanding, demeaning father: Sissy. Hofler, via extensive research with Dunne's diaries and papers and numerous interviews, peers into the psyche of an outsider who wanted desperately to be an insider, a queer who wished to be straight about his sexuality, a social climber, snob and despite his many artistic and sexual insecurities, a genuinely kind colleague and friend. By the 1960s Dunne married ("It's what gay men did then") an heiress, had three children, found himself in an enviable Hollywood social circle and whirl and in competition with his younger brother John Gregory Dunne and his wife Joan Didion. Then, following a divorce, drug and alcohol addictions and a derailed professional standing, there came a brutal descent where he was not so much run out of town as he fled for the hills. Gradually, a comeback followed as Dunne scored as a true crimeinspired novelist. The 1982 murder of his successful actress daughter Dominique Dunne by her chef boyfriend irrevocably changed Dunne into an avenger, a champion for murder victims who no longer could speak for themselves. His Vanity Fair reporting – on the courtroom trials of his daughter, O.J. Simpson, the Menendez brothers, Phil Spector, Claus von Bulow and Michael Skakel - made Dunne a household name, the host of a TV series, and very rich. Hofler understands what drove Dunne, evaluates the contrast between the private and public lives and in the process offers an intimate view of a changing America over a half-century. Dunne was a great gossip – this is a great read – and the SAGE Book Group will be discussing it via Zoom on June 12, from 11 AM to 12 noon.

The Skinny on Skicn

The skin is the largest organ of the human body, unbeknownst (my \$10 word of the year) to many men and women who think otherwise. Seniors already know our skin changes with age. We are not happy with these changes but we must be aware of some for our health benefit. Summer is here and we have to be mindful of our skin care.

Our skin is constantly changing and new skin cells (slowly now) are being formed from the deeper layers to the surface, and then shed. As we age, the dead skin cells remain on the surface longer. This makes the skin looks rough and scaly. Our skin elasticity decreases which can cause sags and wrinkles. Skin becomes thinner and blood vessels are easily injured resulting in multiple bruising. The skin also heals more slowly. Yes, this sounds like a downer but we can still survive and enjoy life.

Xerosis / Asteatotic Eczema

The skin's natural oil decreases and skin becomes dry & itchy (Xerosis). Red patches and scaly indentations can appear (Asteatotic eczema). I have this on my lower legs. Your dermatologist can give you special creams to control the problem. Floridian seniors especially must have a dermatologist full body examination yearly. The following can also cause dry skin: not drinking enough liquids, overexposure to the sun, dry air, smoking, stress, diabetes, kidney disease and daily bathing, especially hot baths. Hospital nurses do not give daily baths to seniors anymore (unless necessary), as it causes more dry skin.

Age Spots and Skin Tags

Age spots (aka liver spots) are flat brown spots caused by previous long sun exposure. Sunscreen products help prevent additional spots. Some creams will reduce the color but see your dermatologist for information. Skin tags are flesh-colored growths with a raised surface. They are harmless but may get irritated at their location and may require removal.

Skin Cancer

There are three types of this skin cancer caused by the sun, tanning booths and sun lamps. Basal cell and squamous cell cancers grow slowly and rarely spread and are treatable. They usually appear on the head, face, neck, hands and arms. The third cancer is melanoma which is more serious and deadly.

Moles

Moles can be a problem so you have to monitor them. Check your visible moles and ask a friend for assistance to check areas you cannot see (such as your back) using the following tool.

Check Moles, Birthmarks, or Other Parts of the Skin for the "ABCDE's"

- A = Asymmetry (one half of the growth looks different from the other half)
- **B** = Borders that are irregular
- $C = \underline{C}$ olor changes or more than one color
- **D** = <u>D</u>iameter greater than the size of a pencil eraser
- E = Evolving; this means the growth changes in size, shape, symptoms (itching, tenderness), surface (especially bleeding), or shades of color

See your health practitioner right away if you have any of these signs to make sure it is not skin cancer.

There are many types of skin disorders and diseases. You and your health practitioner/dermatologist must complete a scheduled assessment of your skin. Please be safe.
